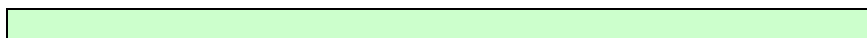

Holy Communion is administered when a child is in second grade, traditionally at the age of 7 years.

Confirmation is administered when a child is in seventh grade, traditionally between the ages of 10 and 13. When Joliet became a diocese in 1948, Confirmation was administered every several years with the largest class in 1961. That year 380 candidates were confirmed. With the availability of more bishops in the diocese, confirmation became more frequent. Since 1962 there were only two years that there were no confirmations. The largest class since that time was in 1970 when 98 were confirmed. In 1983 and 1985 there were two classes of 80 each, the two largest classes in recent years. In 2015, over 70 confirmations were celebrated at the parish, which was the largest number of students confirmed in a single year since 1974 (this did not include the years when confirmation was celebrated every other year).



ST. PATRICK'S CHURCH PASTORS (1838-PRESENT)
--

1838-1840	Rev. John Francis Plunkett
-----------	----------------------------

The first pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Fr. Plunkett was assigned by Bishop Gabriel Bruté of Vincennes (now Indianapolis), to minister to those building the Illinois & Michigan Canal to care for their spiritual needs. Arriving in Joliet in 1838, Fr. Plunkett established over twenty parishes in the Northeast Illinois area, from as far north as Bensenville to as far south as Kankakee, from as far west as St. Charles to as far east as the Illinois/Indiana border.

Fr. Plunkett died in a storm on March, 14, 1840 while returning from a tour of his missions. He was buried under what was to be first St. Patrick Church and later moved to St. Patrick Cemetery (plot space unknown). A Monument, large Celtic Cross, was placed in the approximate place of his burial by the Catholic Women's League in 1968.

Various accounts give different information concerning his birth date and education. He may have been born in 1798 or early in the 19th century. He may have been educated by the Augustinians in Ireland or Philadelphia. The most reliable information is that he was ordained by Bishop Brute of Vincennes, Indiana and eventually sent to minister along the Illinois Michigan canal to the many workers and the sick dying of malaria. As Woodruff wrote: "To dig a canal at least four things are necessary—a pick, a wheelbarrow and an Irishman." This is portrayed so well at our Joliet Historical Museum on Ottawa Street.

1840	Most Rev. Jacques Maurice de San Palais

Future bishop of Vincennes (now Indianapolis), IN, Bishop Vincennes served as temporary pastor after the death of Fr. Plunkett until a new prelate could be named for the area.

1840-1844	Rev. Hippolyte Du Pontavice
-----------	-----------------------------



The future Vicar General of the Vincennes (Indianapolis) Diocese, Fr. Du Pontavice inherited a great debt which he personally found ways to dissolve. When the new Diocese of Chicago was established, the Bishop of Vincennes withdrew his priests. The steeple was erected on the new church as a guide for travelers on the canal. Later when De La Salle High School was built at this location they imitated the steeple, as you still see today on the Victory Center, the successor of Joliet Catholic High School.

1844-1850	Rev. John Ingoldsby
-----------	---------------------

Fr. Ingoldsby was the first pastor appointed by the first Bishop of Chicago. During his pastorage, work resumed on the canal and the economy improved greatly. A bell was donated by Felix Ingoldsby and was rung not only for the Angelus and other church functions but also as a fire alarm for the city. Fr. Ingoldsby is buried in St. Patrick Cemetery.

1850-1858	Rev. George A. Hamilton
-----------	-------------------------



Upon his arrival, Fr. Hamilton re-named the church "St. George," maybe for his own patron or for George Erhard, the pioneer benefactor of the parish. The parish school began in the basement of the church. During his time, a German priest was assigned to the parish with the intention of moving the German parishioners of the parish into a new home. This was accomplished in 1852, when the Church of St. John the Baptist in Joliet was formed. As a result, the parish debt soared, leaving the parish with a great loss of members.

1858-1869

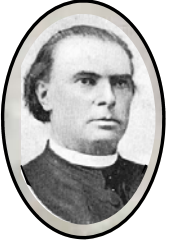
Rev. Patrick Farrelly



Upon his arrival, Fr. Farrelly immediately changed the name of the church back to St Patrick's! At the same time, St. Teresa School was established as the parish school, with the Holy Cross Sisters as the teachers. Other ethnic groups established parishes, taking more people from St. Patrick's. One of them being St. Mary Carmelite parish established on the east side of the canal.

1869-1886

Rev. Walter H. Power



Coming to St. Patrick's with a significant debt weighing upon her, Fr. Power left a very successful pastorship in Geneva, IL to take on this challenge. Through his efforts, Fr. Power was able to eliminate the debt and leave the parish on sound footing. During his tenure, Fr. Power enlarged and remodeled the rectory. In 1880 the Ladies of Loreto came to take charge of the parish school. Father Power died at St. Patrick's and was for a time buried in the parish cemetery until his friends moved his remains to Calvary Cemetery, Chicago.

1886-1911

Msgr. Patrick W. Dunne



Fr. Dunne had been assistant pastor at St. Mary's, Joliet, and much to his surprise was named pastor the day after Fr. Power's funeral. With the help of his own father, St. Patrick Church underwent a complete renovation including the removal of Fr. Plunkett's remains to St. Patrick Cemetery. The 1889 celebration of the 50th anniversary of the parish set the precedent for all the successive celebrations down to our time. Marquette Hall opened as the new school in 1896 with steam heat and electric lighting. In 1903, the bell was recast by Stuckstede Company of St. Louis, MO. Father Dunne was the first American priest to be invested as a Monsignor in 1922.

1911-1917	Rev. Peter Paul O'Dwyer
-----------	-------------------------



During his brief stay at St. Patrick's, Fr. O'Dwyer built a new rectory and entrusted the school to the Adrian Dominican Sisters, Mother Camilla and eight companions. After living in adverse circumstances in the old rectory, the Sisters moved into the convent on Marion Street during the summer of 1918.

1917-1961	Rev. Monsignor Philip L. Kennedy
-----------	----------------------------------



By far the longest serving pastor at St. Patrick's Church (almost 44 years!), Msgr. Kennedy became pastor when Archbishop George Cardinal Mundelein of Chicago announced three major changes in Joliet:

1. St. Patrick's would be moved from Broadway to Marion Street.
2. St. Raymond Nonnatus parish would be formed from a section of St. Patrick's. Fr. Francis Scanlan was appointed pastor to the new parish.
3. The Christian Brothers would use the parish buildings as a central high school for boys.
4. Three pastors lived together during this transition time! Only in 1922 was the bell moved from the old church to Marion Street.

Monsignor Kennedy's accomplishments during his long term were phenomenal! In 1919, Fr. Kennedy saw to the completion of the new parish church, identical to its twin, St. Raymond's, one mile north on Raynor Avenue. After the Diocese of Joliet was established in 1949, Fr. Kennedy was given the title Monsignor by Pope Pius XII and in 1960, St. Patrick's dedicated their new school on Willow Street, where the enrollment at the time surpassed seven hundred students.

1961-1965

Rev. Monsignor John W. Desmond



Having the unenviable task of replacing Msgr. Kennedy upon his death, Msgr. Desmond became the new pastor with an amazingly good transition. Following the directives of the Second Vatican Council, major renovations of the parish buildings took place during his tenure.

1965-

Rev. Monsignor Peter F. Seidl



Msgr. Seidl was a student of the Joliet Diocese's future first bishop, Most Rev. Martin D. McNamara during his seminary days. Msgr. Seidl was also a classmate of Rev. Romeo Blanchette, the second bishop of Joliet. To help with the parish financial obligations, Father Seidl began the practice of tithing. Vatican Council II necessitated many changes in the parish, especially in the liturgy and Msgr. Seidl was a very popular and well-liked priest during his brief stay at the parish.

1970-1974

Aux. Bishop Raymond J. Vonesh



Named an auxiliary bishop of Joliet while serving as Pastor of St. Patrick's in 1971, Bishop Vonesh remained as pastor until 1974, establishing the Parish Council in 1972 and the Council of Catholic Women in 1974. Serving as Vicar General of the Diocese and pastor of this large parish was an overwhelming ministry. Bishop Blanchette would not accept his resignation from the chancery position, so he resigned as pastor.

1974-1978

Rev. Henry L. Wilkening



Fr. Wilkening was well known for his hospitality and care of the needy. He implemented the new rite of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The large parish debt was a great source of concern. The bell was off its moorings but the pastor did not consider its repair a priority. Fear of St. Patrick School closing was so real that he set up the "Living Memorial" scholarship fund for needy students. Soon after the "Adopt a Child" program was inaugurated. In 2012, Fr. Wilkening celebrated his 60th Anniversary of his priesthood ordination.

1978-1990

Rev. Vytautas A. Memenas



The twelve years that Father Vytas Memenas served as the 15th pastor of St. Patrick Church were some of the finest years the parish experienced in its 150 year history." Inheriting a \$300,000 debt upon his arrival, Fr. Memenas was able to eradicate the debt, allowing the school to prosper during his tenure at the parish. Serving as a chaplain for the Joliet Police Department at the time, Fr. Memenas celebrated his 50th Anniversary as a priest at St. Patrick's in 2007.

1990-1995

Rev. George Klepec



Serving as a US Army Veteran and Civil Lawyer prior to and after Ordination, Fr. Klepec honorably serves many parishes in the Joliet area, including In 1985, Father George was named pastor of St. Andrew Church, Romeoville, followed by assignments as pastor of St. Patrick Church, Joliet (1990); St. Joseph Church, Joliet (1995); and St. Paul the Apostle Church, Joliet from 2002 to 2009 when he retired for health reasons. Continuing the sacred work of his predecessor, Fr. George prided himself on engaging the students of the school in the areas of sports and classical music.

1995-2006

Rev. James Lennon



A homegrown priest in Joliet, Fr. Jim Lennon was a very popular cleric, both in the diocese and at St. Patrick's Church. Overseeing a major renovation at the parish in 2000, Fr. Lennon was responsible for upgrading the parish facilities and serving the diocese in so many capacities. Fr. Lennon returned to St. Patrick's in 2007 to celebrate his 50th Anniversary as a priest in the Joliet Diocese. His ministry to those in the priesthood and consecrated life, at both religious order and diocesan levels, is well known.

2006-Current

Rev. Peter Jankowski



Having the difficult task of closing St. Patrick's School in 2011, Fr. Pete Jankowski introduced the "Head Start" program to the community a year later, bringing in 175 children of low income families who were in need of the basic necessities of life. During Fr. Pete's tenure, the Food Pantry grew to serve over 300 families a month. Starting Hispanic ministry in 2007, the parish enrollment has almost doubled since he came to the parish. Of the thirteen parishes currently in Joliet, St. Patrick's ranks first in yearly weddings, third in Religious Education Enrollment and third in baptisms celebrated. In 2011, Fr. Pete blessed the St. Brigid Adoration Chapel. Since then, the parish has created a social hall, upgraded the parish facilities and provided more handicapped accessibility to its faithful as well.
